2015's Highlights!

Since starting to sponsor students in 1995 (now 20 years ago!), we have helped hundreds of young people to graduate and build a better future for themselves and their community. This year, Jean was delighted to attend the graduation ceremony of Setegn Alemu, one of our early sponsored students, in the Netherlands, where he was jointly awarded his PhD in Agriculture by the Universities of Wageningen (Netherlands) and Aarhus (Denmark). Setegn was a star student at Azezo High School, before going on to study Agriculture in Hawassa University. He taught for three years at Dilla University and was then offered a scholarship to study in the Netherlands, where his outstanding work led to him gaining further sponsorship to study for his doctorate. It was an honour and a joy to be there for the defence of his thesis on behalf of all of his friends and family in Ethiopia. Now we await our first female student to gain a doctorate!

As well as Setegn's success, 11 of our sponsored university students have graduated and so are now job searching. These are being replace by 19 sponsored students who have gained places at Higher Education establishments all over Ethiopia; thus this coming year we have the most sponsored students in higher education than ever before (a total of 112, plus a further 80 in secondary education)! Your help therefore continues to be invaluable!

Many of you might remember the request from Bruh Tesfa in Adigrat (Tigray) to help them open a hostel for Year 12 girls. We are delighted to say that it has opened with your support and this year it has 11 girls living there, all of whom are doing very well. Thank you all so much for your efforts!

Plans for 2016

Our plans for 2016 are many and varied as we continue to support our sponsored students and improve the provision of education in Azezo as a whole, thereby benefitting the entire community!

These plans obviously include continuing to **sponsor our individual students** by providing them with monthly stipends to cover some of their expenses, as well as uniforms for those in high school.

We will also continue to **support the blind and partially sighted children** who live at Saint Raphel's School, run by the Daughters of Saint Anna. Modern technology means that many of the barriers to education that previously stood in the way of the blind or partially sighted have now fallen; and we want to ensure that the many blind children who attend the schools of Azezo have access to equipment such as laptops, digital recorders and sports facilities.

Through the support of the Japanese government, Azezo High School has recently completed a massive development of new classrooms and a library for the students in Years 11 and 12. This school has **3700 students registered** for this academic year and so at the time of writing we are reviewing the needs of the school and its pupils with the school director. **Keep an eye out for further developments on this via the website in Spring.**

We were treated to a delicious gourmet lunch and managed to raise over £2000 for the AKT, as well as supporting the Clink Charity, which trains prisoners as chefs and waiters and helps them in the rehabilitation process when they are released, in order to reduce reoffending rates. It really is another worthy cause and it was a privilege to speak to those who waited on and cooked for us. Thank you to all those who came along and helped make the day such a success.

Prior to this, in September, Egigyu and Julian hosted a scrumptious Ethiopian dinner at their house and donated the proceeds of £250 to the AKT. A very warm thank you to them both for their generosity and for having given all the attendees such a wonderful time.

We are looking to organise similar events in the coming year to raise money for our projects, raise awareness of our work and highlight the beauty of Ethiopia to a wider audience. If you or anyone else you know have any ideas or would be able to help us plan something, please do get in touch!

Where is Azezo?

Azezo is situated approximately 10 km from Gondar city in the Gondar region of Ethiopia. More than 50% of the population is aged 15 and under. This is a very poor community, with limited infrastructure or facilities to help children with their education. It is, however, a town that is developing and in the last year some progress has been made with the introduction of cobblestone side roads.

Many children in Azezo are orphans or live in single parent households. Without education, they are condemned to a life of poverty. Since the beginning of the AKT more than 160 children have completed higher education with your help. Many of our earliest students have gone on to study for higher degrees including PhDs! It is through education that can be best equipped to help with The market in Gondar: a vibrant and improving the lives of their own families and local

community; by becoming teachers, nurses, doctors, lawyers, engineers, agriculturalists etc. We are exploring ways to harness the support of those who graduated in the early days of AKT.
